Here's some good news for winter-weary souls: the season of Lent begins on March 5 and the word *Lent* is related to the word for *Spring*. If Lent is here, Spring cannot be far behind.

Lent is the church season of preparation for Easter. It is 40 days long, recalling Jesus' 40 days of temptation in the desert and the ancient Israelites' 40 years of wandering in the wilderness. The season might be considered a sort of spring-cleaning for the soul, a time to clear out the accumulated clutter and refocus on spiritual priorities.

Our worship experiences across this season will focus on the seven last words, or sayings, of Jesus. Taking into account all of the gospels, we find seven last utterances from the cross. One of these sayings will shape each of our Sunday morning worship times and we will hear the last one "It is finished" on Maundy Thursday.

A person's dying words are often believed to have special significance. Jesus' last words include

words of comfort and farewell, prayers for himself and for others, and perhaps even a sort of setting his earthly affairs in order. Join us for worship as we ponder these words together.

Another opportunity for spiritual spring cleaning comes in the form of three sessions on prayer. They will be offered during the Sunday School hour on March 2, 16 and 23 and

during the Wednesday Bible study hour at 1:00 on March 12, 19, and 26. These sessions will explore different styles of prayer and offer prayer exercises to continue during the week. The time together will include conversation about those prayer exercises. We hope to learn from each other and from the writing of other spiritual guides. Whether or not you usually attend Sunday School or the Wednesday Bible study, please consider making this your Lenten discipline.

From Service to Others...

America for Christ Offering
to be Received

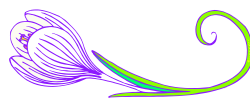


In our community there are countless people in need of Jesus' love and uplifting touch. You may contemplate how you can reach out and make a difference in so many lives. It's a difficult challenge to take on as an individual, but as American Baptists partnering together, we can make a difference by supporting the America for Christ Offering 2014. This year's theme—"Seek Justice," based on Isaiah 1:17—is a biblical reminder that Jesus' public ministry was all about advocacy, engagement and compassion for people in need. Through the work of American Baptist Home Mission Societies, which is supported by the America for Christ Offering, we can participate with our Lord in seeking justice for those in our churches and neighborhoods. Did you know the following?

- In 2011, the official poverty rate was 15 percent, with 46.2 million people in poverty (U.S. Census Bureau).
- Immigrants largely arrive through legal channels. Foreign-born people in the United States numbered 39.9 million in 2010: 44 percent were naturalized citizens; 24 percent were legal permanent residents; 29 percent were unauthorized migrants; and 3 percent were temporary legal residents, such as students or temporary workers (Center for American Progress).
- In 2009, 7.2 million people were in prison or under official supervision, such as probation. This population is larger than the state of Washington. Four in 10 prisoners return to state prisons within three years of release (businessinsider.com/11-facts-about-prisons-2011).
- Approximately 6 million students in grades seven through 12 are struggling to read at grade level. Among the highest, 70 percent of eighth graders read below the standard (Alliance for Excellent Education).
- Teacher quality is one of the most significant factors related to student achievement. In the United States, 14 percent of new teachers resign by the end of their first year, 33 percent leave within their first three years, and almost 50 percent leave by their fifth year (Alliance for Excellent Education).

Our mission and ministry are needed now more than ever. The America for Christ Offering 2014 supports our churches, neighborhood action programs, advocacy, training and community impact by facilitating leadership workshops and conferences, promoting excellent discipleship resources through Judson Press and providing opportunities for churches, individuals and youth groups to participate in home mission through Volunteer Ministries.

We will receive the America for Christ Offering on two Sundays, March 23 and 30. Please give generously. Together, we can change lives as we "seek justice" as followers of Jesus Christ. Together, we can make a difference. "*Learn to do good; seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, plead for the widow*" (Isaiah 1:17).

Pray the Devil Back to Hell
Lenten Movie Night
Friday, April 4

Join us for a film that portrays prayer combined with action for justice. *Pray the Devil Back to Hell* tells the story of Women of Liberia Mass Action for Peace, a group organized by Leymah Gbowee, a social worker who eventually received the Nobel Peace Prize. By convincing the Christian and Muslim women of Monrovia, Liberia to work in partnership, the group's efforts led to peace after years of civil war. Thousands of women — ordinary mothers, grandmothers, aunts and daughters, both Christian and Muslim — came together to pray for peace and then staged a silent protest outside of the Presidential Palace. Armed only with white T-shirts and the courage of their convictions, they demanded a resolution to the country's civil war. Their actions were the critical element which brought about an agreement during the stalled peace talks.

A pizza supper will be served. Join us for this inspiring film and conversation afterwards. The film depicts the reality of the brutality of war. It is not recommended for children. Parental discretion is advised.
