

Pastoral Ponderings

I recently had two occasions to be the receiver of sermons, instead of the deliverer. One was at the CREO service for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, where our own Edith Leet was the preacher. The other was at Trinity Church Wall Street in New York City with preaching by the Right Rev. Michael Curry, the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church. On both occasions, the sermons contained important content and moving delivery. Being on the other side of the pulpit, I was reminded again of how hard the task of listening is. It is a discipline in which many of you engage faithfully. I know that you do so, because

you offer my own words back to me at times and because you ask follow-up questions at others. I want you to know that I appreciate your discipline in doing so.


The early Christians were known as “followers of the Way.” Their way of life was the way of Jesus. They believed significant things about the person of Jesus and the nature of God, but they were known for how they acted, for the ways they practiced their faith. Regular engagement in worship, gathering with our faith community, allowing ourselves to be shaped by Scripture and prayer and proclamation – these are weekly faith practices at Emmanuel, along with many others.

During the season of Lent, we will explore the theme *A Way of Life for a Searching People*. Christian Educator Dorothy Bass defines Christian practices as “things Christian people do together over time in response to and in light of God’s active presence for the life of the world in Jesus Christ.” Lent was often used as a time of orientation to Christian faith. We will use this season to think more deeply about how to express our faith more consistently in every day life. Together we will examine activities like hospitality, honoring the body, forgiveness, and saying yes and saying no.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 10. Join us for a pancake supper at 6:00 followed by worship. Our worship will include the option of receiving ashes, an ancient practice, which serves as a reminder of our mortality and an expression of sorrow for sin. Additional special worship services will occur on February 23 and March 15 and on Maundy Thursday, March 24. Watch for more information on those events coming soon.

Jesus offers a way of life that has integrity and leads to wholeness. This way is not easy, but it offers hope to us and to others. It is *A Way of Life for a Searching People*.

Our Lenten emphasis will be on faith practices which are things we do on a regular basis to nurture our spirituality and discipleship. Journaling is a faith practice.

For the 40 days of Lent, you are invited to engage in this practice. No previous journaling experience required. We will be using the resource *40 Soul-Stretching Conversations: Writing a Spiritual Journal* by Joan Chittister. Sister Joan began to keep a spiritual journal to chart her way into a deeper relationship with God. For 40 days you can write your own spiritual broodings alongside Sister Joan's and other seekers who have dealt with the same kinds of soul-stretching questions, doubts and hopes that you have. It's an opportunity to participate in a rare conversation built on the belief that you are—each of you and all of you—the real subject matter of the spiritual life. You may choose to engage this resource as a personal practice. You might also choose to engage in a small group that shares insights and conversations about the practice. The small group

will meet at 6:00 p.m. on 3 Tuesday evenings, February 16, March 1 and March 8. If there is interest, we will create an on-line option for sharing as well.

The books will cost \$7 plus shipping. To order a book or indicate your interest in a small group, please sign up on the clipboard in fellowship hall or call the church office no later than January 31.

Pancake Supper Scheduled

Many churches have a simple worship service on Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent. Other churches have a traditional pancake supper on Mardi Gras, the last day before Lent begins. Here at Emmanuel, we believe in making the most of every opportunity and mixing and matching elements from many traditions. Back by popular demand, the Lent Committee presents Pancakes on Ash Wednesday. Join us at 6:00 on February 10 for a pancake supper followed by a time of worship with the imposition of ashes. Receiving ashes is always optional. Look for a sign-up sheet in fellowship hall to reserve your place at the pancake feast.

From Service to Others...



As the Service to Others Commission seeks to develop ways and means for the congregation to respond to the greater community's needs, we support many partners through donations, time, and talents. Do you know about all of these local partners?

Interfaith Partnership for the Homeless (IPH) empowers individuals and families who are homeless or facing homelessness, giving them the tools to be self-sufficient. This includes shelters with meals, showers, and case management support, daytime safe havens, health outreach programs, and youth programs. Capital Area Council of Churches (CACC) sponsors the Emergency Overflow Homeless Shelter in Albany and, in collaboration with member congregations and social service organizations, raises and provides funds for food pantries and soup kitchens. They also organize the CROP Walk, which will be May 1, 2016.

FOCUS Churches of Albany provides an Interfaith Food Pantry, Breakfast programs, School Supplies, Gardening in a Bucket, and more through their local programs. Also, FOCUS recognizes that mercy and justice go hand in hand, and seeks to move the struggle to end hunger from *charity-only* responses to an embrace of *justice*. To achieve that, FOCUS provides tools and inspiration that educate and empower grassroots religious advocates to find their voices and speak out to their political leaders. In the past few months, this has included the "Beyond15 - Toolkit for Ordinary Organizers" workshops about poverty and economic justice issues facing the state. This workshop provides tools and strategies to take the next steps in building an economic justice movement for the long-haul, and visited Emmanuel in the fall of 2015. FOCUS has also developed an Advocates program, where members of FOCUS congregations join together to mobilize our congregations and communities to address and change the public policy decisions that result in ongoing poverty and hunger. In the past few months, this has included the Economic Justice workshops about poverty and economic inequality. The workshops provide an overview of FOCUS programs along with information about the economic justice movement in NY state. Participants learn about the issues, train in advocacy skills, and participate in organizing for change in ways that are rooted in their faith callings.

At the state level, the NYS Council of Churches worked in 2015 with secular and religious partners to encourage the Governor and legislature to enact a living wage of \$15 and help lift millions of working New Yorkers out of poverty. Peter Cook took the helm as Executive Director after Paula Gravelle's retirement in 2015, and Peter has quickly jumped in to the fray, participating in demonstrations at the Capital and continuing the Council's participation in the Faith for a Fair New York effort.
