## *Pastoral Ponderings*



In my Easter sermon, I referred to the poem *Threatened With Resurrection* by Julia Esquivel. In it, she suggested that those who were massacred or disappeared in her homeland of Guatemala were threatening the living with resurrection. I am reading her poem in an English translation and like most poetry, it is densely written, so I am still working to understand it. But my best sense is that she might mean this threat in two ways. First, it is a threat that the dead might themselves come back to life, if the living don't take their own lives seriously enough. And second, the threat is that belief in the resurrection of Jesus compels us to affirm life, and to affirm that life by steadfastly and continually opposing the death-dealing of injustice, oppression and all forms of sin and evil.

Sometimes, we are threatened by Resurrection. We want to wallow in our bad habits. We want to take the easier route of simply coexisting with social structures and systems, rather than having to question or challenge the ways that bad systems create social inequities and injustice.

But sometimes, we can be the force that wields the Power of Resurrection. In Esquivel's words, we are part of the "marathon of Hope". Instead of being the despairing, we are the hopeful and we bring the hope of Christ to others. I have this image of the people of Emmanuel as a force to be reckoned with -- each of us in our ways threatening sin or evil with Life.

Howard Thurman, that great African-American theologian from the last century said, "Don't ask what the world needs. Ask what makes you come alive, and go do it. Because what the world needs is people who have come alive." People who have come fully alive -- that's the threat of Resurrection. As we watch the natural world come fully alive this season, may we also be enlivened with the abundant love and life offered in Jesus the Christ.



Elsewhere in this newsletter, the Service to Others Commission recognizes those dedicated EBC members who help to make the FOCUS food & outreach services available to our neighbors who cannot afford the basics. This is an important step towards addressing the separation that the current system of economic inequality creates among us, and helping us to better understand what it is actually like to live in poverty. But I worry that when we are serving people who are in poverty a divide emerges, while unintentional, between Us vs. Them.

One way to bridge this divide is to move more deeply into community with one another, such as to have social gatherings where we can experience our solidarity and interconnectedness. Getting to know each other and enjoy each other helps build a stronger and richer community, and helps us all work more effectively for social and economic justice. I believe this is a calling for the church. At the most basic level, fighting together for an economic system that works for everyone is about fostering God's Kingdom here on earth.

FOCUS and the Capital District Raise the Wage Coalition hold events – Easter breakfast, the Holiday Party and the March Potluck – to encourage this fellowship. We hope to hold more of these. I hope you all will join us. As we gather, I hope to hear your ideas and suggestions for how we can better build community with one another. 

## Making Sense of the Cross

For most of Eastertide (the months of April and May), our adult educational focus will be on Making Sense of the Cross. Written by Dr. David Lose, President of Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia, this resource explores many pressing questions about the cross, such as "Did Jesus have to die?" and "What does the cross reveal about God?" Each session will include a video presentation summarizing one chapter of the book as well as time for group conversation and response.



Over the six weeks, we will examine the four gospel accounts of the crucifixion and recall three major streams of theology about the cross, also called atonement theories. By the final session, we will seek to integrate all of that into real-life application. Participants may choose to read the book, but can also participate fully without reading. Pastor Kathy will be ordering books soon. If you would like to purchase a copy for \$15, please tell her or call the church office no later than April 3.

## Can You Serve in this Way?

From time to time, there is specific work to be done that is not covered by our existing commissions. We are looking for volunteers to help accomplish three tasks in 2016/2017. Each committee will function for a short time, do its work and then disband. A person does not need to be a member of Emmanuel to serve on these committees -- a genuine interest in the task and a willingness to put some time and energy into it are all that is required.

**The Stewardship Committee** requires 7 people. We will be using the focused materials we used last year, called New Consecration Sunday. The first meeting will be in September and the committee will disband in mid-November.

**The Retreat Committee** is charged with planning an intergenerational event focused on having fun and building relationships. The first meeting will be no later than June for an event in late summer/early fall. Emmanuel Friedens Church will also have representatives on this committee as we are planning on a combined retreat again.

**The Annual Meeting Committee** needs people willing to help organize an event that celebrates our mission and ministry as well as organizing the necessary business at the end of the calendar year. We anticipate having a catered church dinner as part of the annual meeting in January 2017. This committee will meet for the first time in October or November and the bulk of the work will likely happen in January.

    The birds of the air for shelter


I see God's power and glory in the ocean waves crashing on the shore
