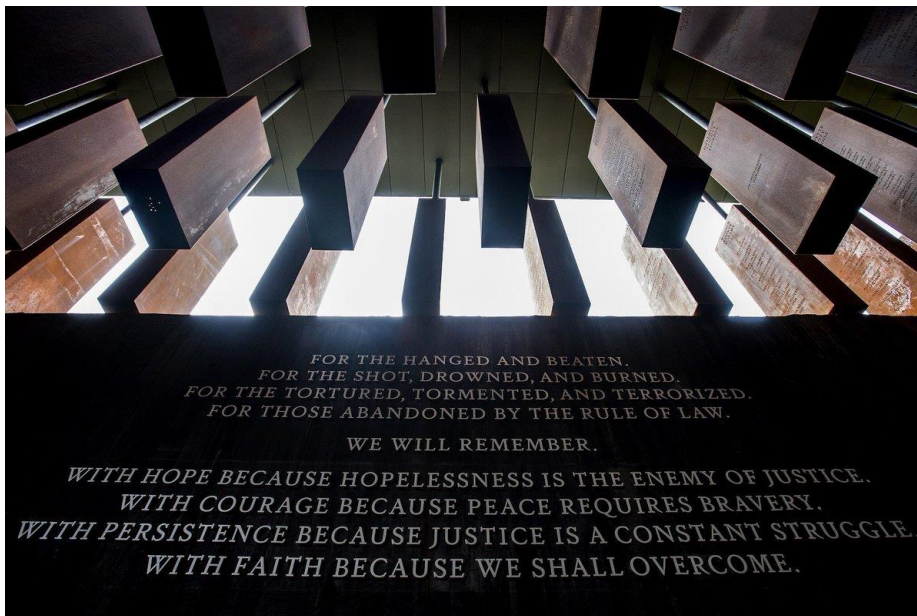

Pastoral Ponderings

Some people say “If you’re not **angry**, you’re not paying attention.” Others say “if you’re not **depressed**, you’re not paying attention.” Perhaps you would choose another adjective – sad, discouraged, frightened – take your pick. The work of social justice has always been important at Emmanuel. It seems more important and even harder lately. The January 6 hearings, Supreme Court decisions against bodily autonomy for women and in favor of government-led prayer, the tragic loss of life to gun violence in Uvalde, Texas and several mass shootings since then – I have had conversations with several of you about each of these recent events. You **are** paying attention and you are angry, depressed, grieving, and/or frightened. I hear you. I feel the same way.

National Memorial for Peace and Justice



Last month, I was reminded of some good words often repeated by Bryan Stevenson, the founder of the Equal Justice Initiative. He says that **hopelessness is the enemy of justice**, and that **hope is our superpower**. Resignation, or acceptance of the status quo, robs us of the hope and energy for change. And so, while I may be angry and discouraged, I am also resolved to remain hopeful.

I hold to hope is by remembering others with far less privilege than I carry, who have been faithful and engaged for far longer than I have. Or I turn to favorite passages of Scripture. Today I am thinking of Romans 8:28 “And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him,”(NIV) Or I sing songs like “We are a gentle angry people and we are singing for our lives”

I often preach on social justice themes. Sometimes, I am convinced that preaching on social justice at Emmanuel is like hauling water to the sea. You already know the centrality of justice within God’s character and concerns. But lately, I am thinking that right now we especially need to remember the words of the prophets about justice rolling down like mighty waters, and the teachings of Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount. We need to keep teaching and preaching love and justice, perhaps not with the primary intent of persuading others as much as so that we remain faithful. In the words of an old spiritual, let us “walk together children, don’t you get weary.”

Emmanuel has been awarded a grant of \$10,000 through **reKindle**, a congregational development program administered by Columbia Theological Seminary in Decatur, Georgia. This grant initiative, which is underwritten by the Lily Endowment, began in 2021 to engage church leaders in a theologically informed strategy to rekindle congregational vitality in a post-Covid-19 era. The grantors summarized our multi-page application like this:

The past decade, and especially the past several years, has brought the realization to Emmanuel Baptist that they must look at significant change to be a continuing congregation of care and ministry. Emmanuel has an aging, but historic and architecturally significant, building that challenges their finances. The church’s urban location, with religious, ethnic and cultural diversity, is part of Emmanuel’s mission and identity. However, the tension between upkeep and mission has significantly increased as congregational resources diminish. Emmanuel Baptist wants to better understand how their message should be presented to the 21st century audience.

In other words, we are asking what God is calling us to do in our current ministry context. This is not a new question, but the pandemic has brought it into especially sharp relief. With the funding from this grant, we expect to bring in a consultant who has assisted many churches through internal discernment processes. **What we learn in this process will be incredibly important. We need congregation-wide participation. The consultant will design a number of different ways to listen to us, probably beginning in October. Please plan to engage as deeply as you can. More specific information is coming soon.**

As part of the grant, Columbia Seminary will gather representatives from each of the recipient churches for a conference on topics like congregational identity, dynamics and adaptation for thriving. Jean Burton and Pastor Kathy will attend this event in on the seminary campus in September.
