Pastoral Ponderings

I opted to have a roommate for the conflict mediation training in Kansas City in August. That's pretty unusual for me. Introvert that I am, I would usually prefer some time and space on my own, especially given that the choice involved committing to sharing a hotel room with a stranger for 10 days and nights. But I also try to be a good steward of my continuing education money and having a private room was more expensive.



It turned out to be really good decision. My roommate Nancy was fantastic. She had a car and volunteered to drive three of us to campus each day. The third person in the car was an activist from Myanmar who is currently studying political science in the US. Our large-group sessions got intense some times and it was wonderful to have someone to debrief with at the end of the day, even after the conversations in the car. Nancy lives in a suburb of Chicago very near where I grew up. In fact, my high school was a major rival of the high school in her suburb. I meet a lot of people from the Chicago area. No one is ever familiar with my south-side suburb of Dolton, but Nancy was. So that was fun.

I talked to Nancy a LOT! I also tried to do my share of listening, but I was frankly amazed at how much I talked. Nancy's gracious listening probably elicited some of that, but my chattiness also probably had a lot to do with the limited number of people I have been talking to for the last two years – Jim already knows all my stories! I didn't realize how much I was missing ordinary, face-to-face conversation with regular human beings.

That experience makes me wonder what other new patterns I've settled into without realizing it. It makes me consider activities that I should be intentional about and where I should put effort into resuming practices that I abandoned when the pandemic set in. It makes me wonder those same things about our communal church life.

We are engaging those questions this fall in at least two significant ways:

First, we are planning for more in-person events, including Sunday School for children and youth. We do so, mindful of the strengths and limitations of Zoom technology, with the desire to provide quality experiences for everyone. You may have gotten out of the church habit. It may take more intention and effort to participate on Sunday morning and/or in events other than Sunday morning. I encourage you to make that effort at whatever level you can. If you attend worship on Zoom, make the effort to turn on your camera. We love to see and hear each other. If you could attend in person, but inertia is keeping you away, talk yourself into giving it a try. You might discover that you didn't know how much you were missing it. We will continue to provide hybrid worship, so you can always go back to Zoom.

Second, with funds from the ReKindle grant, we have engaged a consultant, Joy Skjegstad. Joy will facilitate a process to help us identify our current mission priorities and to name those with whom God is calling us to be in ministry and to make decisions about how we will do that. These are questions that we were asking before the pandemic, but the pandemic has changed us and revealed new realities. The congregational process will begin in October when Joy comes to Albany. Watch for more details coming soon. Everyone’s participation will be important for a successful outcome to that consultation.

Thank you for all the ways you keep showing up – on Zoom, in the room, in phone calls and text messages and sometimes, even in person! Who knew that talking to an ordinary person face-to-face could be such a gift!




FOCUS Worship

Emmanuel is the grateful recipient of a new weaving, *Etz Chaim* (Tree of Life), created and woven of linen and organic cotton by Judy Henningson.

The Tree of Life is an archetype in a great number of world religions, past and present. It may represent creation, fertility, immortality, the nature of God and the connections among all life on Earth and Heaven itself.

Direct references to *Etz Chaim* appear in Genesis, Proverbs and the book of Revelation. In Jewish tradition, the phrase is used as a synonym for the Torah and rabbinical literature. The meaning has expanded to include synagogues, yeshivas and the faithful congregations that follow scripture. In Christianity, it is also regarded as a symbol of the cross and of Christ.

Gather to seek peace and pursue it, in a variety of ways. Our texts will be Micah 4:1-5 and Ephesians 2:11-22. Worship will include a number of different elements, including a blessing of the backpacks as we recognize the start of the school year. Additionally, Elijah teaches

African and African American Studies at Georgetown University. Prior to coming to the Alliance, Elijah served on the pastoral staff at Calvary Baptist Church in Washington, D.C. Elijah is originally from Liberia, West Africa and grew up Baton Rouge, La.






Easy way to Lower Carbon Emissions

One purchasing decision that will help lower carbon emissions is to choose electric over gas-powered tools such as lawnmowers, snowblowers, leaf blowers, chainsaws, trimmers, and power tools. For example, the EPA estimates that hour-for-hour, gasoline powered lawn mowers produce 11 times as much pollution as a new car. These electric tools do not sacrifice power, are low-maintenance, quieter, easier to start and operate, and you can ditch that gasoline tank in your garage. So, when it comes time to replace that old power tool, go electric.
